Commodore's Corner

I am excited to be well enough after knee surgery to resume working on our boat's electrical system, and am confident that we will be able to answer the bell when racing season starts on Thursday, April 14. Then we have the American Rover cruise on the following Tuesday. Life is GOOD! Speaking of the American Rover cruise, club volunteers will bring delicious hors d'oeuvres for everyone. But don't leave your money belt at home! You will want to purchase a libation or two from the ship's galley, and the crew will be working hard to earn your generous tip.

We have been working over the last month to do a little spring cleaning on the BBSA Web site. Doing so reminded me of how much the Internet has done for the sailing community. In the first place, publishing the BBSA Banter via email saves money, time, and is environmentally responsible. When the club was founded in 1958, a first-class stamp was 4 cents and a gallon of gas cost about a quarter. While the cost of tangible goods continues to rise, the cost of electronic information transfer continues to decline. If we were still sending physical copies of the Banter to all of our members, we would no doubt have to raise additional operating funds, most likely through increases in dues.

I know that some folks still receive paper copies of the Banter. In some cases, folks might not have Internet access and/or may not be Internet savvy. Some may just prefer to read a physical copy. Either case is fine, since we send few enough copies so that this is not a significant cost to the organization. But if anyone is getting the Banner mailed to them because of frustration with email, the Web site, or with Adobe Reader, let me know. These types of problems can usually be easily resolved, and I would be happy to help.

Do you have some favorite sailing Web sites? Send them to me and I'll share them with everyone in a future Commodore's Corner. Here are a few from my collection.

Have you read the Racing Rules of Sailing and studied the Cases and Appeals? Feel comfortable with your knowledge of the rules? Put your expertise to the test by taking the quizzes at http://www.uksailmakers.com/RulesQuiz. Learn more fine points at http://www.sailingworld.com/sw experts.jsp?typeID=402&catID=595.

Weather sites make up the bulk of my sailing bookmarks. In fact my home page (the Web site that opens automatically when I start my browser) is the Sewells Point weather sensor at http://www.iwindsurf.com/windandwhere.iws. I also like the radar images at http://weather.noaa.gov/radar/latest/DS.p19r0/si.kakq.shtml. I will sometimes call up the local television stations' sites to access their radar images, but I think the NOAA site is best. The wind forecast found at http://co-ops.nos.noaa.gov/CBOFS/wind forecast.shtml is a great idea, but I haven't found it to be particularly accurate. It's still fun to compare predictions from this site with conditions we find on the water, and I expect the predictions to get better as more is understood about local weather patterns. And the marine forecast is available at http://weather.noaa.gov/pub/data/raw/fz/fzus51.kakq.cwf.akq.txt in case you don't have a weather radio receiver available. There are several sites that feature tide tables. My favorite is http://tbone.biol.sc.edu/tide/tideshow.cgi?site=Hampton+Roads%2C+Virginia.

I dropped a few positions in last year's Plantation Light race because I was not aware that the light at the Cape Charles mark had been replaced with a temporary light with different characteristics. Since then my new best friend has become the Local Notice to Mariners page, http://www.navcen.uscg.gov/lnm/d5/.

I also frequent many of the retail sites for price comparison before making any significant purchase. Surprisingly, Amazon.com had the best price on the latest addition to our GPS collection. There are too many other retail sites to mention, as well as brand-specific sites for gear (instruments, radio, autopilot, engine, stove, lighting, wood finishes, etc). But in closing I want to mention one final site: http://list.sailnet.net/read/all-forums/. This is an index to the multitude of email distribution lists hosted by retailer Sailnet. I subscribe to the Catalina 38 list, and find it very valuable and informative to have an easy way to communicate with other C38 owners.

Broad Bay Sailing Association Cruisers welcome all members to come cruise with us on this years cruise. You can come with us either or both of the weeks. There is not much in the way of new turf this year and we have all been to these places numerous times and we will all help you get up and down the Bay. We have the waypoints for the cruise and would be happy to meet with you and provide them to you.

The two-week cruise will start out with a sixty-mile trek to Reedville, just below the Potomac River and the northern most significant port in Virginia on the Chesapeake. The Reedville Marina and the Crazy Crab are the same place and have excellent food. It started as a restaurant and the owner added the marina as a means of attracting more customers. There are plenty of anchorages around and taking your dinghy to the restaurant is common practice. It can be noisy until ten as the outdoor patio is next to the dockage.

Next is about 35 miles around Tangier Island, past the Tangier light spider into Tangier Sound and up to Crisfield. Crisfield is on the Little Annemessex River. Somers Cove Marina is a state owned marina operated under contract. It is a large marina that is enclosed with an anchorage in the center. I've seen a lot of catamarans anchored in the center pond. There are several good restaurants and we will start with the Side Street Cafe, which is a crab house with brown paper for crabs. There is a swimming pool or two and pavilions for picnics. We can adjust the second night with a good restaurant or a cook out. There is a decent grocery store within walking distance. The best grocery store is Woodburn's in Solomons, which is the next stop.

After an extra day in Crisfield, it is now about 35 miles to Solomons where I have chosen to anchor just north of ZahniserÕs and in front of the museum. Also we will be in front of The Captain's Table, which is scheduled the next time through. It is very easy to dinghy over there to the restaurant. We could raft up here for a while for cocktails and supper. It is also about a mile dinghy ride to the downtown strip (Tiki Bar).

The next stop is Oxford with the Robert Morris Inn for dining. It has some of the best crab and seafood cakes on the Bay. There are no reservations but at this time of the year and mid-week, there should not be a problem. This is a 35-mile trip up the Choptank River to the Tred Avon River and a 35-mile trip back the next day. There are several anchorages at Oxford. One is in the creek that separates the peninsula and the other is off of the ferry landing on the Tred Avon and in front of the Inn. I have not been to the Hinckley Boat works but have been to the previous owners place many times, which was Crockett Boat Works.

Now, we are back to Solomons and the Spring Cove Marina. It is a very well managed marina with a nice pool and a wooded picnic ground. It is within walking distance of Woodburn's Grocery, which is large and very good. This is an excellent place to stock up for the next week cruise. They have an excellent salad bar lunch. Just one block away is an excellent bar-b-q place, also a good choice for lunch. Spring Cove also has block ice to stock up your ice chest for another week. One year they had 25lb. blocks. They also have excellent laundry facilities available.

The final stop is about 32 miles around Point Lookout on the Potomac and up the river ten miles on the Maryland side to Smith Creek. It is an old fixed dock marina with a good rate. It has a pool and pretty good showers. Spinnaker's was wiped out by the hurricane of 2003 and has been rebuilt and has been excellent in the past. It should be a dining treat that evening.

With an early start, we are off to join those starting the second week at Jackson Creek, just off of the Piankatank, about 43 miles away. This is slightly further than the cruiser coming from the south must cover. We will anchor in one of the two branches and probably raft up for cocktails and supper. There is a marina for those interested on the eastern branch, Deltaville Marina, telephone 804.776.9812. I have not stopped there since the 2003 hurricane but went by there last year and it looked substantially rebuilt.

We will pay a second visit to Reedville, which will be 25 miles to the north. The same information on the previous Reedville paragraph applies.

The next day we will come back to Dozier's Regatta Point, at the entrance in Broad Creek on the Rappahannock River side of Stingray Point, just past the point. The rates are good with a pool and A/C restrooms and a grill to have a cook out on the grounds. Also for those interested, there is the Boat House Restaurant a short dinghy ride across the creek. It is supposed to be good.

On Tuesday, we will be off to the Eastern Shore and Onancock and a night on the hook near the oil pier in the center of the town harbor, about an hour's time from the outside R2 entrance into the river. It is less than 200 yards to the town piers where we will spend the next evening. We plan to eat on board. For anyone interested there is the town bakery on the east side of the road in the town center at the top of the hill, quarter-of-a-mile. They have great sticky-buns that may require a reservation the day before. You can also check when you can pick them up the next morning.

Wednesday, we'll have another day on the boat and will tie-up at the town dock around noon. They have a nice city restaurant for lunch next to Bizotto's where we plan to dine for the evening. The restaurant for lunch moved into town center from the highway about three years ago. Onancock is noted for antiques.

Thursday, we cross the Bay to Windmill Point Resort with a pool and a new face-lift around the marina. I will go there in May and may have an update after my initial visit with the new look. This is a 29-mile trip and with an early start, should have the afternoon for the pool.

On Friday, we go around Windmill Point Spider to Indian Creek and another anchorage, somewhere in Indian Creek depending on a couple of factors. We will plan on eating on board that evening. The details for Indian Creek will be worked out prior to departure from Onancock.

The next morning we will leave early for York River Yacht Haven, which is past Windmill Point Spider, Wolf Trap, York River Spit Spider and up the York River-about 43 total miles. They have a nice pool and places for a picnic. YRYH has the RiverÕs Inn Restaurant and I plan reservations inside which is resort casual dress (collared shirt, long pants and shoes). They have a deck, outside, for the really casual.

Sunday is a leisurely trip down the York and home (24 miles total).

- 1. The telephone numbers of the marinas and the cost per foot are listed. Most have a \$3-\$5/night charge for electricity, however, I believe it is inclusive at Windmill Point. Hinckley, Spring Cove, Onancock, and York River Yacht Haven are expected to be crowded, so early reservations are recommended.
