Cruise Week 2005

The two week cruise started as scheduled on June 3rd, a little later in the day than expected due to a depressing weather forecast calling for NE winds up to 25 knots and small craft advisories on the Bay. After the Southern Bay racers left at 9am for the first day of races, "Dreamtime" and "Wind Walker" decided to head north at 9:30am to Jackson Creek for the first evening. "Beach Magic" deferred until a better day. There was little wind and thick fog and up to a knot of current against us all afternoon making for a long day. After some soup and crackers, it was a very quiet night at anchor; no wind and no noise. On the second morning we were greeted with sunshine and north winds to sail to Crisfield. It was a wonderful day for a sail with favorable wind and tide. It was seventeen miles of sailing to Tangier Light and then powering up the sound to Crisfield. We arrived early in the afternoon in time to do chores before dining at the Side Street Café crab house. It was a nice evening and an early retirement due to

sunshine and wind during the day. The weather forecast remained optimistic for the next week. Sunday was a nice and relaxing day with clean up and other boat chores.

"Beach Magic" arrived at 2pm and reservations were made for dining at the Waterman's Inn for the evening. At that time there were three boats tied up for the evening on and near the "I" dock T-head. Waterman's is an excellent small cozy restaurant, one block in front of the museum gate to Somers Cove Marina. The meal was excellent and the waitress was wonderful. We also noticed that the temperature had started to get over ninety and it was A/C time. It is a boat yard and has nice rest rooms and is convenient to the Robert Morris Inn.

The dinners were mostly crab cakes and seafood cakes with Jim having salmon. The breads, apple butter and relish tray provided for an outstanding appetizer. The vegetable plate was nicely done with asparagus, egg plant, potato cake and corn pudding. This makes two really good restaurants on our first week of cruising.
