RACING NEWS

BBSA racers were plenty active in 2018 with our 4 major events as well as our 2 beer-can series and other Southern Bay weekend events. 21 boats raced in the Cape Henry Cup in May and 18 made their way through a few rain squalls to the finish line. Big thanks to Eric and Cathy Brinsfield for providing the Signal Boat. In August, 80 boats signed up for the 15th Annual Leo Wardrup Memorial Cape Charles Cup. The event committee, under the steady hand of Chair, Randy Goodman, delivered another great event in addition to the requisite light winds. Thanks to all the personnel on the race committee including Preston and Sherry Carraway (signal boat), Mark and Sheryl Merrick (signal boat), Bill Pardee (mark boat) and Homer Babbitt (East Area Lead Dog). Thanks to foul weather, the Broad Bay Sailing Championship for the Bold Mariner Cup was postponed from July to September. 20 BBSA members competed and Little Creek defended their title and ability to talk trash for another year. Big thanks to Doug Rose for being the PRO and providing the signal boat! One week later, BBSA wrapped up it's bigboat season with the Neptune's Atlantic Regatta and more prayers to the wind gods with little luck. Neptune added his curses as well with a most foul current. Only 8 of the 21 boats were able to finish the 15 mile course before the time limit. Once again, Event Chair, Jerry Pattenaude, and his committee, ran an excellent event with 2 great parties. Thanks go out to Andy Spittler for providing the Signal Boat and Chris Talbert for providing the mark boat (and Butch Patterson for recovering the finish mark!).

The 2019 Southern Bay Racing Schedule has been finalized and will be posted on our homepage as soon as BBSA can agree on a date for the Bold Mariner Cup.

US Sailing is offering their One Day Race Management Seminar at Fishing Bay YC on February 23rd, which teaches almost everything you need to know about running a race (starts, finishes, writing NORs and SIs, mark boats, etc.). I will be attending this workshop, so if anyone is interested in going, we can carpool up there. Registration information is on our homepage.

BBSA is offering a Racing Rules Workshop about the 4 Things Every Racer Should Know on February 9th to be held at Old Dominion University. This workshop is given by long-time BBSA member and US Sailing Certified Judge, John McCarthy. Registration is available on our website. I hope you will make plans to attend as this informative workshop that will teach you much more than just Rule 14.

This past November, PHRF of the Chesapeake had their annual meeting. Chris French attended this meeting with the proxy from BBSA. As of this time, they still have not posted the meeting minutes, but Chris French gave me a short brief of the discussion:

BBSA made a motion to combine PHRF B and C fleets (since half of the southern bay races were only offering a combined PHRF B/C fleet). In my opinion, PHRF needs to fix this problem (by rearranging the fleets), instead of leaving it up to the individual southern bay clubs to decide whether they will combine or leave them seperate. Apparently, no one agrees with my opinion as the motion was not seconded. As the old saying goes, if you don't have anything good to say.... so, I'll just keep my mouth shut about those who have the power to fix the problem, but wouldn't. Chris also mentioned that the (relatively) new PHRF of the Chesapeake website now allows all PHRF certificates to be viewed. This is a nice, new feature. Also, the 1-day Safety at Sea course can now be done online with a test. There were also a few other motions (shown below):

- -Motion to clarify "Temp" certificates for charity (etc.) races.
- -Motion to change language of safety recommendations due to Gulf Coast disaster resulting in liability litigation and criminal prosecution
- -Motion to clarify required club affiliations for PHRF Distance and CBYRA High Point Series. [SIDE NOTE,

PLEASE ENSURE THAT WHEN YOU APPLY OR RENEW YOUR PHRF CERTIFICATE, PLEASE PUT "BBSA" IN THE BLANK FOR YOUR CLUB! Willoughby Racers, Little Creek Sailing, or any other funny little yacht club name you put in there are NOT recognized by PHRF OR CBYRA!]

There will also be some effort towards developing guidelines for implementing ToT scoring.

Thank you, Chris, for taking the time to attend this meeting for BBSA.



Virginia Breeze, 11/30/2018

Hi everyone,

The intrepid travelers have just entered week 4 of ICW cruising. So far so good except that Florida seems to be having a record cold spell. We were held up by weather at Morehead City and St. Augustine, but we made up for any delay with a fast 500 mile, mostly sailing outside, run from Wilmington to St. Augustine.

Challenges on the trip so far are: **it's cold!** Also, you have to remind yourself that you are not on vacation. We eat out a fair amount and French fries and dessert are great for a week's vacation but if we do that for four months we'll come back with a big belly and lots of regret.

We have learned that ICW etiquette can be tricky. Some powerboats are reckless and dangerous when they pass. We also are relearning Cribbage. We don't seem to watch much TV on the boat and we have lots of free time.

The only repair needed is a shower pump that we are picking up in Stuart, FL. We have already been contacted by the welcoming committee Doug and Judy Rose and I am sure they will give us the skinny on Stuart.

Sequel, 12/1/2018

Seaquel is tied up safely in Titusville Florida Municipal Marina and we are back in Hampton Roads for the holidays. We left Oct 4th and arrived in Titusville Nov 12th. The trip included an excursion to Edenton NC, a 4-day hiatus as we waited for Hurricane Michael and a few other lay days for weather. We bypassed one offshore opportunity from Carolina Beach, NC to Charleston because our favorite part of the ICW is the Waccamaw River in SC. We took the other offshore day-hop opportunity from St Catherine's Sound to St. Simons to bypass 3 places on Georgia's ICW which require using the 8' tide to get through spots that have less than 3.5' at MLLW.

When we last went south on the ICW in the fall of 2016, it was a bit nerve racking due to the TMI (too much information) syndrome. Active Captain reports of shallows appeared mile after mile and we found ourselves using our chartplotter, iPad, and iPhone as navigational aids. This time, we went to the source, where possible, using Army Corps of Engineers hydrographic surveys and used vetted reports on WaterwayGuide.com. We didn't run aground on the ICW but did manage to ground and unground ourselves coming out of a SC anchorage at dead low tide. In comparison to our first trip down the ICW in 1988 before chartplotters and other aids, we ran aground or came very close numerous times. Now the biggest challenge on the ICW is for boats with tall masts. We saw many bridges with 64' clearance at high tide and a few with 63' clearance. One of these is south of the St Johns River in an area with only a foot of tide. We saw many boats anchored waiting for the tide to go through and watch one boat as it deployed all kinds of weights on the starboard side to make the boat heel about 20 degrees in order to make it through a bridge. That would be nerve racking! Thankfully, Seaquel's mast is 56' plus antenna.

We enjoyed many old favorite places along the way including Coinjock, Wrightsville Beach, Carolina Beach, Georgetown, Beaufort (SC), Ft George, St Augustine and Titusville and found some new favorites: Jekyll Island, Walberg Creek, and Fernandina Beach. Along the way we met up with friends who live along the route and fellow cruisers.

We'll be headed back to Titusville on December 28th and hope to cross over to Bahamas as soon as we get a weather window for the Gulf Stream. We're headed for Goldilocks' temperatures, not too hot and not too cold. If plans hold, we'll be back with Seaquel in May to join the cruising fun in the Chesapeake.

Submitted by Randy Goodman concerning proposed changes to Little Creek entrance: Fellow Sailors and Boaters,

The Joint Expeditionary Base (JEB) Little Creek Commanding Officer hosted some boat and business owners concerning the Little Creek Harbor Security Zone that was proposed by the US Army Corps of Engineers last May.

Based on the inputs of many of us and others, the Base came up with what I believe is a great compromise:

- No new Security Zone in Little Creek Harbor, unless there is a serious threat to National Security (Similar to what happened directly after 9/11).
- There will be a Limited Wake Zone in LC Harbor starting at the Jetty, going to the back of the harbor near Cobb's Marina. This will be enforced by USCG & other Law Enforcement, not the US Navy.
- Navy asks that boaters monitor channel 12 when entering /leaving LC Harbor. (Essentially as a courtesy, but not a requirement that will be enforced, as long as you are not in the inner harbor security area).

Below is a more detailed explanation.

UPDATES TO PROPOSED LITTLE CREEK HARBOR REGULATIONS

Background:

On May 23, 2018, the US Army Corps of engineers posted Public Notice NAO-16-0332, (https://www.nao.usace.army.mil/Media/Public-Notices/Tag/19691/little-creek) stating the District Commander had received a permit application to create a New Restricted Area in Little Creek Harbor, which essentially would make the entire Little Creek Harbor a restricted area controlled by the US Navy.

The Joint Expeditionary Base Little Creek (JEBLC) Commanding Officer held a meeting on November 28, 2018 to discuss a modified proposal. Attending the meeting were some members of his staff, some concerned boaters and business owners, including representatives from the Broad Bay Sailing Association (BBSA) and its Little Creek Sailing Association (LCSA).

Update (from the JEBLC Public Affairs Officer):

The Navy welcomed the constructive public feedback to the Proposed Rulemaking for a Code of Federal Regulations in the Little Creek Harbor. The JEBLCFS Base Commander worked with the Army Corps of Engineers to adopt changes, based on the feedback, that enhance base security needs while making the channel a safer environment for public and commercial boaters.

The following are key revisions of the proposal:


- 1. Virtually **no changes in appearance to Nautical Chart 12255**. The existing Emergency Restricted Area marked on the chart (see attached) has been in place for at least 17 years. Although implemented as a temporary action following September 11, 2001, this Proposed Rulemaking will make this permanent and consistent with similar waterways in the United States.
- 2. All vessels transiting inbound/outbound of the main channel of the Little Creek Outer Harbor shall proceed at speeds commensurate with minimum wake. This designation will provide improved safety

and security to all users including the military while still allowing the public to proceed at speeds that support safe navigation. The public will continue to enjoy the regular use of the channel in the Outer Harbor transiting to marinas, restaurants, and property along the waterway.

3. **Vessel operators** who have VHF radios **are encouraged to monitor Channel 12** thereby receiving potential critical information from Little Creek Port Control.

NOTE: Outer Harbor access may be restricted in the event of a significant emergency such as an attack similar to those that occurred on September 11, 2001. Coast Guard Sector Hampton Roads, Virginia Marine Police and other water borne law enforcement agencies would implement the controlled harbor movements. Such actions during a catastrophic event would not only enhance base security, but the safety and wellbeing of those who operate boats, businesses and live in the vicinity of East Beach and Pretty Lake areas.
