Hello BBSA!

I hope the new year has gone well for all of you. We are a month into it and I have seen Facebook posts where many of you have managed to get one or both the COVID-19 vaccines, which makes me happy. BBSA is doing well overall. We came through 2020 in good shape all things considered. Even though we have not had events, we do have expenses and some of those expenses increased in 2020. I have spent quite a bit of time with the commodores of Norfolk and Hampton Yacht Clubs. I am thankful that we are not having to maintain a building and take care of staff when the clubs are not making money. A board meeting will happen in February, where we will discuss boring things like insurance, money and look at the calendar. As soon as state mandates lift and it is safe, we will go back to having membership meetings and some fun events where you can meet the board and catch up with each other!

January brought me my birthday so I decided to focus on the water. I did the Hampton Yacht Club/Old Point Comfort New Year's Day Race on Pete Hunter's Thompson 30, Wairere. As much as I dislike racing against that boat when I race on Voodoo, I have to say I love how she flies downwind with a big spinnaker up. Pete and his crew are always fun to sail with. We had a little oyster roast once we got the boat back on its trailer and everything put away at HYC. A great way to start 2021! Following that race, I did something I said I'd never do. I sailed north in the North Atlantic in January. I had helped move a Jeanneau 42 DS from Key West at the beginning of December for Norton Yacht Sales. We had to bail off of the ocean in St Simons, GA due to bad storms in December. We left the boat at the Jeanneau dealer in Georgia and were supposed to go right back to get it. The first positive weather window occurred on January 6th, a month later. We drove down, fueled up, shot out to the gulf stream, caught a 40-pound yellowfin tuna, and got back to Deltaville, VA. The gulf stream was fairly narrow and very easy to sail out of so we watched sea temperature closely. The center was at 76 degrees and we tried to stay in 74-75 degree water and not go too far east because of some questionable weather reports. At that time of year, we did not want to be in a storm and end up in cold water. We exited around Oregon Inlet in the morning, got to Virginia Beach, and motored through the CBBT in the dark. The cold hit hard once we crossed the CBBT. Thankfully the Jeanneau design has a pretty fast hull and the current was with us because I was colder than I imagined I could be on that last shift. It took us 5 hours to get from the CBBT to Broad Creek in Deltaville. Highlights on this delivery other than catching a big tuna were seeing the M/V Golden Ray shipwreck in St Simons, Ga, and having one of my close childhood friends who is a Virginia Harbor Pilot, send me messages from the kids we grew up with and weather updates on my Garmin Inreach. When we were coming into the bay, he was bringing a ship out. We passed each other. It was great hearing his voice on the VHF, which made me feel more at home than ever. Last week I got to see my childhood buddy and his family. It was fun talking about that experience with them and great to be back home with my people! In hindsight, January showed me that turning 52 wasn't bad at all!

As we go through February and into March, I am hoping for more good weather to get out on the water and hearing your stories about getting out on the water this winter. The days are getting longer, and spring is right around the corner! In the meantime, be thinking of your cruising and racing plans. The new racing rules book has been published. If you are racing, get a copy and become acquainted with it because it will be in effect for the next four years. Most rules are the same, a few have changed. U.S. Coast Guard reminds mariners of hidden boating dangers (info provided by Sergio Diehl):

MIAMI -- The Coast Guard reminds mariners to exercise caution and safe boating practices while boating with cooler temperatures on the water, as there could be hidden dangers aboard a vessel.

Coast Guard Sector Key West watch standers received a report Sunday from a good Samaritan stating eight people aboard a recreational vessel were unconscious near Garrison Bight. It was reported an exhaust fan in the bilge compartment allowed potential carbon monoxide to accumulate to high enough levels to impair the occupants.

A Key West Fire Boat crew responded, safely transferred the eight people aboard their vessel and transported them back ashore to awaiting emergency medical services for further medical attention.

"This reported incident appears to be a very close call," said Petty Officer 1st Class Evans Ahrens, a Sector Key West operations unit controller. "January is the coldest month in Florida where temperatures can range widely from day and night. Boaters know Jacksonville can get cool but not everyone thinks Key West can as well. People should be cautious when using generators or heating elements that they may only rarely use, particularly for those that live aboard their vessel."

The Coast Guard urges the public to follow these safety tips:

Check the Weather and Water Temperature. Do this before heading out and continue to monitor while on your trip. Weather can change very rapidly and you should keep a watchful eye on the forecasted conditions. The National Weather Service broadcasts marine weather forecasts regularly. Forecasts can be heard by tuning in to channels 1 to 5 on a VHF marine radio or by checking the NWS website at www.weather.gov

File a Float Plan. Leave a detailed float plan with a friend or family member who is staying back on land. The sooner a party can be reported overdue, the more likely a positive outcome will result. Facts need to be quickly conveyed in an emergency. Your float plan should include information that rescue personnel need in order to find you. For examples of a float plan, visit www.floatplancentral.org.

Have a marine radio. A VHF-FM radio set to channel 16 is the best method of communication while on the water. Although cell phones are a good backup, they can be unreliable due to gaps in coverage area or a dead battery.

Have an EPIRB. Always go out with an Emergency Position Indicating Radio Beacon. An EPIRB is a device that is designed to transmit a distress signal to emergency responders through a satellite system.

Wear a life jacket. They help keep your head above water if you happen to fall overboard, they also hold heat into the core areas of your body, thus increasing the odds of your survival in cold water by hours.

Never boat under the influence. Boating under the influence, or boating while intoxicated, is just as deadly as drinking and driving. It is illegal to operate a boat while under the influence of alcohol or drugs in every state. Penalties for violating BUI/BWI laws can include large fines, suspension or revocation of boat operator privileges and jail terms. Alcohol use is the leading known contributing factor in fatal boating accidents.

Download the free Coast Guard app. Focusing on recreational boating, the app has a float plan function, the ability to check weather reports from the nearest NOAA buoys, a function for calling for assistance when in distress and more. It is currently available for free on iOS and Android devices.



Information about various navigational concerns of note in VA, provided by Andy Spittler (copied from BoatUS.com) (most of the membership are already aware of... but in case you aren't):

VA – Thimble Shoal Channel Dredging:

Starting approximately 25 November 2020 and continuing until approximately 30 June 2021, Weeks Marine Hopper Dredge "MAGDALEN" and support equipment will be operating in the Thimble Shoal Channel (between Thimble Lighted Bell Buoy 9 (LLNR 9255) and Thimble Shoal Lighted Buoy 7 (LLNR 9235) stopping west of Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel). All dredged material will be transported to the Dam Neck Ocean Disposal Site — DNODS - Cells 5, 6 & 7. Dredging operations will continue twenty-four (24) hours per day, seven days per week basis. The dredge will monitor VHF-FM channels 13 and 16. For more information or questions, contact Matt Henry at 985-237-5050. Chart 12256 (5th District LNM Week 45/2020)

New: VA--Rudee Inlet Survey:

Survey dated 19 Nov 2020. Shoaling remains on the inside, 300' West of the ends of the jetties with a new least depth 8 feet at MLLW. (5th District LNM Week 47/2020)

VA - Hampton Roads Bridge Tunnel Construction Hazard:

Construction on the North Island of the Hampton Roads Bridge Tunnel has begun and 27 steel poles will be installed around the North Island that are 6 inches in diameter and extending vertically out of the water 3 to 8 feet. The steel poles will be marked with flashing white lights and retroreflective tape. Mariners shall use caution when transiting in vicinity of the North Island of the HRBT. For more information or question, contact the Hampton Roads Connector Partners at 757-373-4799. (5th District LNM Week 44/2020)

VA – Hampton Roads Bridge Tunnel Construction:

The second phase of the Hampton Roads Connector Partners construction will begin on the west side and parallel with the Hampton Roads Bridge Tunnels, and will start at the north side at the Hampton Roads land side extending to the south side at the Willoughby land side. The Dredge ESSEX and attendant plant and equipment will commence mobilization operations in Hampton Roads on or about October 22, 2020. Pipeline laying operations will commence first between the Craney Island Disposal Area and Norfolk Naval Station in the vicinity of Norfolk Harbor Reach and the Craney Island Flats. A submerged pipeline will be placed from the northeast corner of Craney Island to the western edge of the Norfolk Harbor Channel in the vicinity of Elizabeth River Channel Lighted Buoy 8 (LLNR 9500). The ESSEX will then commence dredging a trench across Norfolk Harbor Channel, on or about October 27, 2020. The trench dredging should take approximately 2 days.
